TOWN GETS NEW LAKESIDE PARK

Thanks to the energy and persuasive powers of Mayor Jean Gelinas, and the generosity of B. Weinsberg, of Lakeview Gardens Corporation, Baie d'Urfée has a new park area.

Lakeview Gardens had contemplated development of the area as a park, presumably for only the residents of the new sub-division, but in lengthy negotiation Mr. Gelinas urged that it be deeded to the town, for use by all residents. Mr. Weinsberg acceded, and the deeds were signed in mid-October, only cost to the town being that of the deed.

The new park comprises 128,372 square feet on Lake St. Louis, just west of the Binz barns property recently purchased by the town - again as a result of lengthy persuasive negotiations by the mayor - at the bargain price of \$15,000-odd dollars. The new park has a Lakeshore Road frontage of 400 feet, including, of course, the hydro's 60-foot wide right-of-way, and a lake frontage of 500 feet. The new park area is directly across from the Valentine and Walkinshaw properties, and the right-of-way up into the new Lakeview Gardens sub-division.

Acquisition of the new park area and of the Binz property with all the buildings at such reasonable cost are two big breaks for the people of Baie d'Urfée, for today's residents and for those of the future. We are the envy of surrounding communities, and a real vote of thanks is due the mayor and everyone else who assisted in the swinging of the deals.

Minutes of the regular monthly meeting.

Sept. 17, 1954.

School Affairs - Mr. Spriggs has been re-elected for another three years.

Treasurer's Report - An encouraging balance of \$252.56. Present membership - 210.

Recreation - A start was made in forming recreational committees as advocated in the report on recreation in the Sept., 1954 issue of News and Views. It was felt that the rink committee should have its major decisions approved by the Association before taking action. It was suggested that a handicraft group be formed with Joyce Hartnell suggested to head the committee. A committee for swimming will also be organized.

Baie d'Urfee Day - Bill Norcott, chairman, reported a successful Day, with a fine handicraft display, 325 persons at the dance and a net profit of \$22.10. Harry Dixon called for a vote of thanks to Bill Norcott.

Correspondence - Letters to Mr. J. W. Long regarding motions passed at the previous Association meeting were read and also Mr. Long's reply. A letter was received from the St. John's Ambulance Association thanking us for a donation of \$12.00

New Business -

Amendment to constitution regarding the fiscal year. The meeting concurred that the end of the fiscal year should read Dec. 31st instead of Aug. 31st.

Reduction in number of Association meetings. It was decided that meetings should be called when necessary, instead of regularly once a month. However, the Executive will continue to meet once a month, News and Views will be published once a month and special committees being formed will meet when necessary.

Special Association Meetings - The Chairman brought up the subject for discussion, as outlined in the September issue of News and Views.

The Barns - Alderman Herb Brookhouse described the property. It has an area of 70,000 sq. ft. There is one large building and 4 or 5 smaller ones. They are all wired, all have water and all are on concrete foundations. Council has to take up the option by October and the tenant will vacate October 31. Council is borrowing \$15,000 for purchase, plus \$5,000 to renovate. Council is waiting for a proposition from the Association regarding what use the Association wishes to make of the barns and property. Mr. Harry Dixon will head a committee to consider this and will form sub-committees to take care of fund raising, building, etc.

Speed zones - A campaign for speeders for one week was suggested.

LIGHT UNDER A BUSHEL

Several issues ago we told of Miss Harriet Elizabeth Thomson of Baie d'Urfeé having won a scholarship at the University of Toronto . The full import of the award, however, was not understood by us and the modest Miss Thomson didn't volunteer to elaborate. The following item in The Bulletin, published by the University of Toronto Alumni Association, tells the full story. Miss Thomson is the daughter of Mrs. Lesslie R. Thomson, Lakeshore Road, Baie d'Urfeé.

Moss Scholarship

The John H. Moss Memorial Fund, the gift of friends of the late John H. Moss, K C., B.A., is administered by the University of Toronto Alumni Association and is intended to provide the annual sum of \$300 for a scholarship to be awarded under the following conditions:

The graduating class in Arts in each of University College, Victoria College, Trinity College and St. Michael's College, selects by vote the undergraduate whom they regard as the best all-round man or woman in the final year.

The award is made to one of the four selected undergraduate students by a committee consisting of the President of the University, the President of the University of Toronto Alumni Association, and three of its members.

The scholarship was won this year by Miss Harriet Elizabeth Constance Thomson of University College and Baie d'Urfeé, Quebec. After the award, it was announced that Miss Thomson had graduated first in first class honours in Mathematics and Physics, winning the James Loudon Gold Medal and the McLennan Prize in Mathematics and Physics. Miss Thomson was president of the University of Toronto Drama Committee and the University College Players Guild. She had acted in two Hart House Theatre productions. She was a member of the University of Toronto debating team, speaker of University College Parliament and winner of the Portia Trophy. She was an executive member of the Mathematics and Physics Society.

Miss Thomson proposes to go on to post-graduate work at Cambridge University.

BAIE D'URFÉE'S NEW SCHOOL TO BE DEFERRED

It looks as though Baie d'Urfeé's new school is going to be deferred for a while.

The big housing development a-building on Ile Perrot has made it necessary for the school board to take a second look with respect to where the much-needed new additional educational facilities should go. They have pretty well decided that the Ile Perrot situation is more urgent.

This doesn't mean, of course, that Baie d'Urfeé is not going to get its projected elementary school. In fact arrangements for purchase of the land west of Morgan Road have just been finalized.

With the expected increased school population on Ile Perrot it was felt it would be much more practical to build the school facilities there than to transport the kiddies to Baie d'Urfeé. Ile Perrot is within our school area, of course, and therefore, the new

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facilities will undoubtedly mean an increase in our school tax rate.

It had been unofficially hoped that the new school would be operating in Baie d'Urfee by 1956. It will now probably be a couple of years later.

CHICKEN HOUSE SEEN BEST BET SOONEST

A concrete plan for use of one of the town's newly-purchased Binz buildings as a community recreation hall is to be presented to the next council meeting. Council had asked the Citizens' Association to look over the buildings for possible use and then come forward with any ideas they might have in mind.

A committee headed up by Harry Dixon and including Frank Booth, John Fisher, Mary Coulter, Bob Higman, Ted Pilkey and John Windebank has inspected the buildings on several occasions and feel that the chicken house can be utilized soonest but that as a permanent possibility the "horse palace" would probably make the best all-round building. Mr. Dixon will report that for approximately \$500 the chicken house can be modified and be ready for use this winter. The \$500, of course, will have to be raised by members of the Association and most of the work on the building would have to be voluntary.

The chicken house already has a toilet (for people, not chickens) and a couple of space heaters and a certain amount of fixing up are considered all that is necessary to make the building habitable during the forthcoming winter.

Originally it was planned to have the hockey rink on the new town area, being central to all Baie d'Urfites. This will wait until next year, and hockey will be played on Morgan Road. It is planned to extend the Oxford skating rink and it is also possible another rink will be formed at Sunny Acres.

Mr. Dixon urges that all associations and groups expecting or hoping to use the new community hall, get in touch with the committee. Mr. Dixon stresses that the chicken house is the most readily adaptable but that the "horse palace" has terrific potential as a community meeting hall.

SCHOOL AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

OCTOBER 1954

A very thorough repair, maintenance and cleaning job has been done on the school buildings during the summer and everything is in first class shape. Landscaping by Macdonald College for our account has been completed.

The Junior Boys' Playroom and the Industrial Arts Room have been fitted out as temporary classrooms with all necessary equipment. The High School Recreation Room is now in use as a music room.

School registration to date is about 920 as compared with 830 last spring. Kindergarten registration is 100 compared with 80 last year.

Mrs. C. Baridon, Secretary to the Head Master, is now engaged on a full time instead of half-time basis.

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Miss King has been appointed School Nurse. She is an R.N. with considerable nursing experience. She will spend 3 days at Macdonald and 2 days at Hudson each week.

Dr. G. L. Fortier has been appointed Medical Consultant to the School in place of Dr. Kelso who is retiring from this position. Dr. Kelso has served as the School Doctor since 1914. In order to commemorate his 40 years of devoted service to the School, a portrait photo and engraved plate have been mounted on the wall of the Health Office.

A new bus has been purchased for Isle Perrott.

Unpaid taxes to date for our local board area for this year and all past years amount to only \$405. This area includes Baie d'Urfée, Senneville, St. Anne de Bout de l'Isle and a small part of Ste. Anne de Bellevue.

The change in the financial year in Baie d'Urfée is causing the Board considerable difficulty. If the new valuation roll is used, it will not be possible to send out school tax bills before next March and in the meantime, salary costs alone are running at the rate of roughly \$10,000 per month. In addition to this we understand that the new valuation rolls in both Senneville and Baie d'Urfée will show average increases on each property of about 10 to 15%.

As a result of this our local board has decided, for 1954-55, to use the existing valuation roll for Baie d'Urfée and the new valuation roll for Senneville, with the latter adjusted downwards to eliminate the increased valuations.

The purchase of school land in Baie d'Urfée has been practically completed and the option taken up. There is at the moment a last minute hitch due to the Board not having been notified about some revisions last August in the detailed plans of the subdivision which slightly affects the number of square feet. The approximate cost is \$26,000 for approximately 360,000 square feet (8-1/3 acres). A 20-year \$30,000 bond issue has been approved and negotiated with the Bank of Montreal. Interest rate 4%, price 96.5, giving an effective interest rate of 4 1/4%.

The new Pincourt Development on Isle Perrot, now actively underway, will have a very considerable influence on our general school situation. The Central Board and Local Boards are now considering the desirability of building a new school in Isle Perrot in which case a new school in Baie d'Urfée would be deferred for the time being.

M. V. SAUER TO BE HONORED

At the 15th triennial reunion of the University of Toronto Engineering Alumni Association a Baie d'Urfée citizen, M.V. Sauer, of the class of 1902, is to be signally honored with presentation of the Engineering Alumni Medal.

Mr. Sauer was born in Plattsville, Ontario in 1880, and graduated from the University of Toronto (B.A.Sc.) in 1902.

In his early years, Mr. Sauer worked with the Ontario Power Company, Iroquois Construction Company, Greater Winnipeg Water District, Hydro-Electric Power

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Commission of Ontario, Canadian Vicker's Limited, William Hamilton Limited, and Winnipeg Electric Company.

In 1929 he joined the Beauharnois Construction Company as Hydraulic Engineer. He later became Chief Engineer of the Beauharnois Light, Heat, and Power Company. After formation of the Quebec Hydro in 1944 he became Chief Engineer of the generating stations--hydro divisions--until his retirement in December, 1952.

In March, 1953, he was appointed Consulting Engineer to the Department of Transport, dealing with the St. Lawrence Seaway, and in March, 1954, he was appointed Alternate Member and Chief Engineer of the Canadian Section, St. Lawrence River Joint Board of Engineers.

For more than 30 years, Mr. Max Sauer has been well known in Canada as one of the most capable engineers in all phases of hydraulic and hydro-electric work.
