## OUR ASSOCIATION HONOURS WELL-KNOWN RESIDENT OF BAIE d'URFE:

This year has seen the retirement of a much honoured member of the protestant Trustees of Baie d'Urfé. In 1914 the Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Quebec issued an order in council installing Mr. Frank Walkinshaw, Mr. J. Johnson and Mr. Gudewill as frustees to represent the dissentient taxpayers of the school municipality of Ste. mne de Bout de l'ile, Jacques Cartier County. Ever since the inception of the group Mr. Walkinshaw has been an important director of the school affairs of this community. In the third of the century marking 'the span of stewardship of Mr. Walkinshaw there have been many changes. He helped to make the original arrangement with the Royal Institution for the Advancement of Learning (Macdonald College of McGill University) for the education of the children of Baie d'Urfé and sat in on the successful negotiations of 1947 by which the Protestant Department of Education through a Central School Board takes over the task. He saw the rise of the mill rate from the original and the transportation picture change from a private sleigh at two dollars a day to the big modern buses of the present.

Mr. Walkinshaw was born in Birmingham, England and came to Canada in 1889. In 1896 he married Miss Louisa Borthwick of Montreal. Her death in 1948 was a sad blow to her family and the community. Two daughters, Marjory and Grace live with their father in Baie d'Urfé. The present school Trustees are fortunate in retaining the services of Marjory as Secretary-Treasurer. The outstanding record of thirty-five years of service to his community is one of which Mr. Walkinshaw may well be proud and for which the people of the district are deeply grateful. It has been a demanding task and in its many legal and personal aspects has consumed much time, but he has never spared himself.

As some measure of esteem and appreciation the Baie d'Urfé Citizens' Association recently arranged the presentation of a beautiful cigarette box suitably inscribed. Miss Freda Kruse, one of the first people to make her home in Baie d'Urfé, graciously presented the gift on behalf of the Association. Refreshments were served and many members took the opportunity to congratulate Mr. Walkinshaw personally.
