Classes 49 to 57 may be placed on the exhibition tables by the competitor personally.

Classes 49 to 51, collections of perennials, annuals, or cut flowers, to be arranged in vases with necks not over 6" diameter, supplied by the contestant. Will be judged on quality of flowers and arrangement.

Classes 53 and 57, flower arrangements, may be shown in any form of container, and include any types of flowers or foliage. Will be judged mostly on artistic arrangement.

Class 52, table centre, must have a maximum total height of flowers and container of 10".

Classes 54 and 55, potted plants, must have been in contestant's possession at least three months.

- 1) All exhibits must have been in the possession of and grown by the exhibitor for at least six weeks prior to the date of exhibition.
- 2) All exhibitors must be members of the Baie d'Urfe Horticultural Society.
- 3) Children's classes open to those 16 years old and under.
- 4) Exhibitors may show only one entry in each class.
- 5) Any deviation from the exact quantities or preparation of material specified for a class will disqualify the exhibit.
- 6) Exhibits will be received at the Town Hall between 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. on August 11. To avoid a last minute rush and to allow for proper arrangement of exhibits, please bring them in before lunch, if possible. Late arrivals cannot be judged.
- 7) In order to leave space for the evening presentation of prizes, exhibits not awarded first, second, or third prize must be removed by 6:30 p.m. Prize winning exhibits must be claimed immediately following the presentation of prizes. This year it is intended to send unclaimed exhibits to the hospitals.
- 8) Exhibits will not be identified except by their official numbers until the judging is concluded.
- 9) Except for classes 49 to 57 and 25, for which exhibitors will supply their own containers, small flowers will be shown in pint jam jars, and large flowers in quart jam jars. Gladioli will be shown in quart milk bottles. A number of these are available at the Hall, but exhibitors are requested to supply their own where possible.
- 10) The judges' decision shall in all cases be final.
- 11) The judges may, at their discretion, withhold prizes when, in their opinion, the exhibits are not worthy. If there is only one entry in a class, a prize, (not necessarily a first prize), may be awarded, at the discretion of the judges.
- 12) Points will be awarded for first, second and third places in each class, and major prizes awarded on total points scored by the exhibitors. Collections and major classes will carry more points than the less important classes.

PREPARATION OF EXHIBITS

Blooms for the exhibition should be cut in the evening or early morning. Select blooms of an even size. Take an extra one along in case of accident, but count carefully when placing on show table as a bloom over or short of the number called for will disqualify the exhibit.

Where blooms are mentioned there must be only one bloom to a stem.

Flowers may be all one colour or assorted; a variety of colours is desirable.

Do not crowd flowers in vase or basket. Cut stems fairly long, and trim to desired length when placing in containers.

Judging of vegetables is based on "table quality" which means that they should be at the finest state of perfection for table use. Medium size, correct shape and colour for the variety, texture, freedom from blemish, and perfect matching are all factors which should decide the selection. The largest vegetables do not always win prizes.

Vegetables should be dusted or lightly wiped to remove excess dirt, but not washed.

Carrots and parsnips should have $l_2^{\perp \text{\tiny III}}$ of stems attached. Beets 3" stems to prevent bleeding.

Onions should not be peeled, and stems should be left $l\frac{1}{2}$ " long.

Corn should not be shucked.

Tomatoes should be shown with a short piece of stem attached.

Celery and Swiss Chard plants should be left with the roots attached.

Cabbage should be left with a few outer leaves.

The leaves of the cauliflower whould be trimmed level with the head.

For Gladioli showing, the proportion of stem to flower head should be 3/5 stem to 2/5 flower head, or the stem should be half as long again as the spike.

THE RECORD

The regular monthly meeting was held on Friday, June 8, with the Chairman, John Windebank, presiding. The total attendance was seventy-mine. Committee reports were presented - for the Membership Committee, Mr. Waverley announced a membership of 133. Mrs. R. Brown, and Messrs. J. Charters, R. Frauzel, and K. Hale, were introduced to the meeting. Mr. Vauthier announced, for the Recreation Committee, that a backstop was being put up in the East playground. Mr. Windebank said that a Red Cross pamphlet on swimming safety rules would be mailed out, and asked parents to brief their children on these rules, and to be responsible for the safety of their own families. High School students, good swimmers, are asked to help with the instruction of the younger children. A ring buoy, bamboo pole, and 75-foot rope will be available at the wharf. Mr. Fry, reporting on School Affairs, referred to a special meeting which will be held for the purpose of presenting resolutions respecting a bond issue; announcements will be posted at 6 places within this area. If no objecting a bond risks, and the mount is we is raised, it will, after 30 days, be sent to Quebec for approval. The amount to be spent on the School is \$796,000., of which Quebec would pay \$480,000, in 5 equal instalments. The cost to the Town each year, over a 30-year period, would be 20 to 21 thousand. The tax increase would be about 4 mills. The election of School Commissioners will take place on Monday, July 9. The regular term on the School Board is three years. As this is the first year of the present Board's existence, continuity in the membership is being assured by retiring two members this year, two next year, and one the third year. Mr. Fry moved that Mr. Will Spriggs, one of the two members chosen by lot to retire this year, be renominated, in view of Mr. Spriggs' long experience on the Board, especially in conducting the recent negotiations and in advising on engineering problems connected with the School. His motion was duly seconded and carried. Further nominations may be made on July 9, for one hour prior to the meeting.

Mrs. Coulter asked for a volunteer to take the editorship of "News and Views" next year, stressing the advisability of working 4 or 5 months on the paper before taking charge. The meeting favoured a suggestion to bring out a special issue of "News and Views" in July, to give publicity to Baie d'Urfe Day and the Horticultural Show, and to report on the June meeting of the Association. The Treasurer reported a balance of \$361.00, and the Corresponding Secretary reported sending out several letters of thanks and condolence. Mr. Tait announced that the Horticultural Society's Show would be held around the middle of August, notices to go out shortly. Mr. Loke drew attention to speeding on the highway, and was asked to head a committee to study and act on this problem.

The meeting then proceeded to the business of nominations for Town Mayor and Councillors. As a result of the balloting on nominations from the floor, in addition to the slate presented by the Nominating Committee, the following slate was declared chosen -

For Mayor: Mr. D. Allen For Councillor no. 1: Mr. J. Gelinas For Councillors no. 2 & 3: Mr. D. Menzies & Mr. W. Parker For Councillors no. 4 & 5: Mr. D. Laird & Mr. R. Foss For Councillor no. 6: Mr. P. Smith

Mr. Pilkey moved a vote of appreciation to those nominated to the the office of Mayor and Councillors by the Association two years ago, and his motion was seconded and carried with applause.

Tea was served by Mrs. Proudfoot, assisted by Mrs. Coulter, Mrs. Creates, and Mrs. Tuck.

SCHOOL AFFAIRS

The annual meeting of the Baie d'Urfe-Senneville School Board was held on July 9, at which W. E. Butler of Senneville and W. Spriggs of Baie d'Urfe were re-elected as School Commissioners.

A special meeting of our local board was held on June 19 for the opening of the General Contracting and Heating Tenders for the new School Extension. Disappointment was in store for us, as the prices quoted turned out to be very much higher than had been expected, due, apparently, to recent increases in labour and material costs and a very uncertain future. Definitely an unhappy time was had by alls.

On June 28, Central Board members W. E. Butler, J. T. Farmer, W. Spriggs, and secretary V. H. Graham went to Quebec to discuss our situation at a conference with Dr. Percival, Director of Protestant Education, Mr. Desaulnier, Superintendent of Education, and the Hon. French, Cabinet Minister. The outcome of the discussion was that no additional money is available this year, and no promises could be made about next year's budget. We were instructed to proceed with the School Extension within the limits of our available finances.

Costs are now being refigured for alternative schemes involving the temporary elimination of various rooms, etc. Progress is being made in obtaining our loan, although present conditions on St. James Street are not at all favourable. If no further unforseen difficulties arise, it is possible that we may be able to get going late in August.

SAFETY COMMITTEE

Some progress by the newly formed "Safety Committee", working toward a satisfactory solution of out traffic problems, has been made this month. Contact has been made with the Provincial Police Headquarters regarding observance of safe driving - particularly along the Lakeshore Road. We have been promised their co-operation. In turn, we have offered to provide the police with some assistance which might be to report "repeat offenders". Further information is awaited from the Police Director's Office as to the form this assistance might take.

Pressure of other matters, unfortunately, delayed initial discussions with Provincial Transport relative to drivers of that company observing safe driving principles in Baie d'Urfe. However, a very satisfactory recent meeting with the Transport Company's Regional Superintendent definitely indicates their readiness to co-operate. A concerted effort will be made by P.T. Co. in observance of traffic regulations and in maintaining close liaison with your Safety Committee. Practical application of their agreement to co-operate will be closely watched and will be reported in a subsequent edition of this paper and at future Association meetings. Incidentally, each P.T. bus driver on the St. Annes run has been cautioned individually by the Provincial Police as a direct result of efforts made thus far.

It is hoped to call a meeting of the Safety Committee in the near future for discussions on further "ways and means". Matters for discussion, we believe, should include consideration of present adequacy of road signs, partly on Lakeshore Road, but particularly on Morgan Road; how best to "get across" the message of safe driving habits to the taxi and delivery vehicles of St. Annes when operating in and through Baie d'Urfe; and last (and by no means least!) co-operation from the citizens of our own town.

We (and the pronoun is used in its broadest sense), frequently drive with little or no regard for:

- 1) the 30 mile per hour speed limit.
- 2) "STOP" and "SLOW" signs.
- 3) rule that stipulates no crossing of the solid white lines when passing other vehicles.
- 4) very slow driving when passing children walking or playing on or by the side of the road.
- 5) general "road courtesy" that enhances safety.

On the other hand, we can also co-operate by:

- 1) when walking, walk on the left side of the road facing on-coming traffic.
- 2) making sure that our children do not play on the roadways.
- 3) ensuring bicycles are never ridden two or more abreast single file is definitely safer on the narrow Lakeshore Road.


A little problem in arithmetic may help some of us in realizing the time factor involved in a comparison of driving speeds. The average one-way trip along the roads of our town is 1.5 miles. If you drive at 45 m.p.h., how much sooner will you get to your destination than if you drive at the maximum legal speed of 30 m.p.h.? At 30 m.p.h. the trip (through Baie d'Urfe) takes 3 minutes; at 45 m.p.h. the trip takes 2 minutes - 60 seconds less! How often are these "precious" saved seconds worth the potential loss of a single life or the general misery of any kind of traffic accident? I know the answer. Do you?

Lists of the classes, together with the rules and suggestions for preparation of exhibits will be mailed to all members shortly. We would be glad to enrol those who are not yet members, and they can participate in the exhibition and secure all the other benefits of membership in the Society for the fee of \$1.00.

There will be two classes for children 16 yrs. and under - collection of wild flowers, and flower arrangement of any kind of flower or foliage, to be judged mainly on the artistic arrangement. The flowers need not be grown by the children.

Don't be shy about entering. Every year prizes are won by people who start out by saying, "My garden isn't good enough to produce anything for show". Bring one exhibit or as many as you like and let the judges decide and probably surprise you.
